# A Message from the President by Jeff Bixby

Greetings club brothers and sisters,

Also, I taught elementary school for 30 years until I retired in 2008. I am currently co-chair of The Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network of Northeast Ohio (GLSEN NEO). I haven't just talked the talked; I've walked it, too!

Why am I telling you all of this? Because it's my challenge to all of you to be involved, show up, care, take part, network, attend events and support other organizations and businesses that support our community!

# Great Lakes Leather Alliance by Jim Overholser



### Christmas Party by Aazura Bowers



# Mr. Leather Akron Contest by Gregg Lakota



As a part of the Rangers' annual Leatherfest, the Mr. Leather Akron contest was held. Gregg Lakota first introduced the contest in 1992. It used to be held as a separate event, but in the late '90's Gregg asked his club if he could make it a part of Leatherfest. From that point on, it has been an integral part of the event.

This year the contest celebrated its 22nd year, making it the oldest leather contest in Ohio. Gregg selected a panel of distinguished judges: Steve Bianchi (Mr. Ohio Leather 2014), Rocky McCombs (Mr. Ohio Leather 2013), D'Lyla Rose (Miss Cleveland Leather 2014-15), & Jimmy Crooks (Mr. Leather Akron 1992- the very first one). Three contestants vied for the title of Mr. Leather Akron 2015: Carl, David, & Cody. Each contestant competed in the four categories: leather image, on-stage questions, community forum, & leather expression.

During leather image, the contestants' entry forms were read to the audience by Morgan Jeffrey (the current Mr. Leather Akron) while the contestants walked about the stage. The judges evaluated them on their leather attire, the manner in which their attire complemented their physiques, confidence level, masculinity level, and interaction with the audience.

During the on-stage questions, Gregg Lakota asked each contestant to select an envelope from a number of envelopes that he held. Inside the envelope were two serious questions and one light (creative or humorous) question. Contestants were then judged upon their abilities to respond to the questions, their public speaking skills, and confidence levels.

Community forum allowed the audience to ask questions of the contestants, followed by questions from each of the judges. Again, responses and public speaking skills were evaluated.

The final category used to be "fantasy." However, this year it was changed to leather expression. A number of items were placed on the judges' table: flogger, paddle, blindfold, duct tape, rope, & feather duster. The contestant was to select one or more items and demonstrate his ability to interact with these items as either a dominant or subservient. He was evaluated by the judges in terms of his expertise, knowledge, and genuine ability to engage in the role he had identified with.

The contestants all did a terrific job with each of the categories and each of them would have made a fine titleholder. However, Cody Feucht (then a pledge of the Rangers) scored the most points. He far outshined his competitors during leather expression. His "boy side" was expressed so well that the bar became almost silent as the audience watched his subservient nature being expressed. His interaction with Johnny Flex (his designated Sir) caused tented pants to abound within the audience. It was that hot!

This year's winner received a medallion, a title patch, and for the first times ever, a title sash. Congratulations go to boy cody (Cody Feucht), the new Mr. Leather Akron. The Rangers couldn't be more proud than to have one of their own winning this prestigious title

During the summer of 1988, George Roscoe and I had a vision of starting a new club, a levi, leather, uniform club. A short time later Steve Paris, Steve Giaimo, and Mike Samolis joined us in making it a reality. For several months the five of us worked feverishly, developing the Articles of Incorporation & the club bylaws, creating the club colors, and applying for tax exempt status. I don't think any of us realized that one day the Rangers would be the second oldest club in Ohio and now Ohio's largest leather club with 18 full members. In 2007 the club almost folded when it was down to only three full members. However, a group of leathermen from Akron were interested in starting a new club. The Rangers' Board of Trustees met (the original five) and offered the club to the Akronites, saving them the time and expense of starting a new club from scratch. They accepted our offer, and it wasn't long before the club began to grow and become healthy again. I thank God for their enthusiasm and determination to make the Rangers a premier club once again. Some of the original Akronites have moved and one is deceased. However, Scot Baker, Chuck Skidmore, James Jones, & Chuck Harries persevered with the club to this very day. The Rangers is no longer just a Cleveland club or an Akron club; it's a Northeast Ohio club. Six members are from the Cleveland area; eight are from the Akron area; and four are from the Canton area. We have expanded in membership and geographically. Of that I am proud. Moreover, I am even more proud of the fact that brotherhood and camaraderie is stronger than ever within the club. There's no drama; there's no egotism; there's no politics. Everyone gets along. It's the way it's supposed to be. I am so very proud and blessed to be a part of this club. Thank you, brothers & sisters, for making all of this possible!
